An Irish and English Parallel Bible

The Irish translation was accomplished by William O'Domhnuill in 1602, and has been copied from an 1817 edition of that translation. William O'Domhnuill (d.1628), known also as William O'Daniel, Archbishop of Tuam was a native of Kilkenny, Ireland. It was while at Trinity College that William took up the work of translating *The New Testament - Tiomna Nuadh* into Irish. This work was begun by Nicolas Walsh, Bishop of Ossory, who was murdered in 1585, and afterwards it was continued by John Kearney (who translated and published the first Irish [protestant] Catechism, printed in Dublin in 1571), and Nehemias Donellan, Archbishop of Tuam in 1595. This translation was dedicated to the newly ascended King James I, and published by O'Daniel in 1603.

The English translation used in this booklet is the King James Version (KJV) of the Holy Bible, commissioned by King James I of England in 1604. The translation work was completed by forty-seven learned Biblical scholars in 1611 and published that same year. It has had the most profound impact not only on English literature as a whole, world-wide, but also on English-speaking peoples, world-wide! This same version is often referred to as the Authorised Version (AV). Despite its age, it is still very readable by the average reader today, and it remains one of the most widely-read literary works of all time.

Caibidil 1

Chapter 1

Módha na ndeagh easbóg agus na seanóireadh; 12 re peacadh dúthaidh na Gcrétánuigh, in-imdheargadh.

1 Pol, searbhfhoghantuigh Dé, agus absdal Iosa Críosa, do réir chreidimh dháoine thóghtha Dé, agus admhála na fírinne, noch atá réir dhíaghachda;

2 Chum muinighne na beatha marthanuighe, noch do gheall Día, ris nach féidir bréug a dhéanamh, suil do crúthuigheadh an dómhan;

3 Achd do fhoillsigh sé a bhríathar a nám iomchubhaidh tré sheanmóir *an tsoisgeil*, do fágbadh táobh riumsa do réir áithne De ar Slánaightheóra;

4 Chum Títuis, *mo* mhac ionmhuin, do réir an chreidimh choitchinn: Grása, trócaire, agus síothcháin ó Dhía Athair agus ón Dtíghearna Iósa Críosa ar Slánaightheóir.

5 A sé ádhbhar fár fhág mé thú a Gcréta, ionnus go leanfá do chéartughadh na neitheann atá fós gan cheartughadh, agus go nóirdeócha sagairt ann gach cathair, do réir mar do aithin mé dhíot:

6 Má atá neach ar bith neamhlochdach, na fhíor éun mhná, agá bhfuil clann ionnruic, nach féidir éiliughadh fá neamhmeasarrghachd, na easúmhal.

7 Oír as cóir easbog do bheith neamhlochdach, mar fheadhmantach Dé, gan bheith dhó ag ríoth réir a thóla féin, ná feargach, ná ró fhonnmar a bhfion, ná buáilteach, ná dúil do bheith aige a néudáil neamhghloin;

8 Achd na fhear tighe áoigheadh do chongmháil, grádhach air dháoinibh maithe, na dhuine aireach, chomhthrom, náomhtha, mheasarrgha;

9 Ag congmháil na bréithre díse go daingean do réir theaguisg, ionnus go madh féidir léis teagusg do thabhairt úadh maille ré foirceadal fallain agus an dream labhras na aghuidh do bhréugnughadh.

10 Oír atáid iomad do dháoinibh easúmhla ann labhras go diomháoin agus na mealltóiridh, go háirighe an luchd atá don timchillghearradh:

11 Dár ab éigean a mbéul do stopadh, dream chuireas tighthe go huilidhe fá chéile, ag

1 Paul, a servant of God, and an apostle of Jesus Christ, according to the faith of God's elect, and the acknowledging of the truth which is after godliness;

2 In hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began;

3 But hath in due times manifested his word through preaching, which is committed unto me according to the commandment of God our Saviour;

4 To Titus, *mine* own son after the common faith: Grace, mercy, *and* peace, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ our Saviour.

5 For this cause left I thee in Crete, that thou shouldest set in order the things that are wanting, and ordain elders in every city, as I had appointed thee:

6 If any be blameless, the husband of one wife, having faithful children not accused of riot or unruly.

7 For a bishop must be blameless, as the steward of God; not selfwilled, not soon angry, not given to wine, no striker, not given to filthy lucre;

8 But a lover of hospitality, a lover of good men, sober, just, holy, temperate;

9 Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers.

10 For there are many unruly and vain talkers and deceivers, specially they of the circumcision:

11 Whose mouths must be stopped, who subvert whole houses, teaching things which

12 One of themselves, *even* a prophet of their own, said, The Cretians *are* always liars, evil beasts, slow bellies.

13 This witness is true. Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith;

14 Not giving heed to Jewish fables, and commandments of men, that turn from the truth.

15 Unto the pure all things *are* pure: but unto them that are defiled and unbelieving *is* nothing pure; but even their mind and conscience is defiled.

16 They profess that they know God; but in works they deny *him*, being abominable, and disobedient, and unto every good work reprobate.

Teagusg agus eisiomlar Thituis ré bheith 11 do reir sholuis an tsoisgeil, do nuile cháil dhaóine.

1 Achd labhairse na neithe thig ré teagusg fallain:

2 *Eadhon* dáoine áosda do bheith aireach, trómgha, measárgha, diongmhála a gcreideamh, a ngrádh, agus a bhfoighid.

3 Na mná áosda mar an gcéudna, a naibíd iomchubhaidh do náomhthachd, gan *bheith* na luchd éilighe go héugcoir, gan íad féin do thabhairt go hiomarcach dffion, na luchd teaguisg neitheann maith;

4 As go dtiubhradáois fo deara do na mnáibh óga bheith súaimhneach ann a ninntinn, grádach air a bhfearuibh, agus air a gclóinn,

Chapter 2

1 But speak thou the things which become sound doctrine:

2 That the aged men be sober, grave, temperate, sound in faith, in charity, in patience.

3 The aged women likewise, that *they be* in behaviour as becometh holiness, not false accusers, not given to much wine, teachers of good things;

4 That they may teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children,

5 *To be* discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, obedient to their own husbands, that the word of God be not blasphemed.

6 Young men likewise exhort to be sober minded.

7 In all things shewing thyself a pattern of good works: in doctrine *shewing* uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity,

8 Sound speech, that cannot be condemned; that he that is of the contrary part may be ashamed, having no evil thing to say of you.

9 *Exhort* servants to be obedient unto their own masters, *and* to please *them* well in all

10 Not purloining, but shewing all good fidelity; that they may adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things.

11 For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men,

12 Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world;

13 Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ;

14 Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works.

15 These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee.

Caibidil 3

Feile Dé, agus deagh oibrighe do chur a gcuimhne; 9 achd ní híad ceasda éigcéillidhe.

1 Cuir a gcuimhne dhóibh bheith úmhal dúachdaránachduibh agus do chúmhachduibh, urruim do thabhairt úatha úmhadh dá bheith ullamh chum gach uile dheaghoibre mhaóribh,

2 Gan neach ar bith do mhaslughadh, gan bheith brúighneach, *achd* suáimhneach, ag táisbéunadh na huile cheannsachda do na huile dháoinibh.

3 Oír do bhamairne féin ar úairibh éigcéillidhe, easúmhal, ag dul ar seachrán, ag leanmhuin dainmíanuibh agus danntoilibh eugsámhla, ag caitheamh ar mbeatha a miosguis agus a dtnúth, fúathmhar, *agus* ag fúathughadh a cheilé.

4 Achd an tan do shoillsigh féile agus grádh Dé ar Slánaightheóra do dháoinibh,

5 Ní do réir na noibrightheadh bhfiréunnda do rinneamairne, achd do réir a thrócaire féin do sháor sé sinn, tré ionnladh na haithghineamhna, agus tré athnúadhughadh an Spiorad Náoinmh;

Chapter 3

1 Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work,

2 To speak evil of no man, to be no brawlers, *but* gentle, shewing all meekness unto all men.

3 For we ourselves also were sometimes foolish, disobedient, deceived, serving divers lusts and pleasures, living in malice and envy, hateful, *and* hating one another.

4 But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared,

5 Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost;

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6 Do dhóirt sé oruinn go saidhbhir tré Iósa Críosa ar Slanuightheoir.

9 Achd toirmisg ceasda éigcéillidhe, agus seanchuis, agus connsbóid, agus imreasana a dtimchioll an reachda; óir atáid síad gan tarbha gan éifeachd.

10 An tí atá na eiriceach tair éis fógra no dhó thabhairt dó seachuin é;

11 Ar mbeith a fheasa agad go bhfuil a shamhuil sin do neach ar ndul fá chéile, agus go bpeacuigheann sé, ar mbeith dhó damnuighthe úadh féin.

12 An tan chuirfeas mé Artemas chugad, nó Tichicus, déun deithneas ré theachd chugam go Nicopolis: óir is ann sin do chuir mé romhan an geimhreadh chaitheamh.

13 Seól uáid go dúthrachdach sa tslíge Sénas an fear dlighe agus Apollos, ar ghléus nách mbiáidh uireasbhuidh éinneithe orrtha.

14 Agus déunuid an dream as dínn mar an gcéudna fóghluim ar dheaghoibrighibh do dhéanamh chum na ngnáthuightheadh riachdanach, ionnis nach beidis neamhthoruidheach.

15 Cuirid a bhfuil um fhochairse uile a mbeannachd chugad. Teann riot an mhéid ghrádhuiugeas sinne sa gcreideamh. Grása maille ribh uile. Amen.

6 Which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour;

7 That being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

8 *This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works. These things are good and profitable unto men.*

9 But avoid foolish questions, and genealogies, and contentions, and strivings about the law; for they are unprofitable and vain.

10 A man that is an heretick after the first and second admonition reject;

11 Knowing that he that is such is subverted, and sinneth, being condemned of himself.

12 When I shall send Artemas unto thee, or Tychicus, be diligent to come unto me to Nicopolis: for I have determined there to winter.

13 Bring Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their journey diligently, that nothing be wanting unto them.

14 And let ours also learn to maintain good works for necessary uses, that they be not unfruitful.

15 All that are with me salute thee. Greet them that love us in the faith. Grace *be* with you all. Amen.
